Every Girl is a Leader!

The Girl Scouts of the USA was founded in 1912, eight years before the 19th Amendment became law, giving women the right to vote. Juliette knew that the Girl Scout program could help build girls of courage, confidence and character. She gave girls the opportunity to lead and make decisions about what they did as Girl Scouts, so that they could develop "self-reliance and resourcefulness."

At any Girl Scout level, Daisy to Ambassador, Girl Scouts have what it takes to lead the way! For November's patch, girls will experiment with decision-making and planning. Too often, the important Girl Scout concept of girl leadership or GIRL LED, is forgotten. It is easier and less hectic when adults plan troop activities but that is where the girls can learn the most.

Find your Girl Scout's Level below, complete the activities and fill out evaluation paperwork to complete this month's patch.



Daisy Requirements:

-Step One: Your Daisy must talk to other Daisies or Brownies about what they would like to do in their troop or as a Girl Scout. This can be a future activity, badge, or anything they think of.

-Step Two: Your Daisy must make a basic plan on how they think they can do the activity or badge from Step One.

-Step Three: Your Daisy must make an illustration or write out their basic plan. This is theirs to keep; you do not need to turn it in.

-Step Four: Your Daisy must share this plan with the rest of the troop.



Brownie Requirements:

-Step One: Your Brownie must talk to other Brownies or Daisies about what they would like to do in their troop or as a Girl Scout. This can be future activity, badge, or anything they think of.

-Step Two: Your Brownie must make a plan on how they think they can do the activity or badge from Step One. This should include supplies they may need, if it costs any money, and who will also do this activity with them.

-Step Three: Your Brownie must make a list of what they may need for their basic plan. This is theirs to keep, you do not need to turn it in.

-Step Four: Your Brownie must share this plan with the rest of the troop.



Junior Requirements:

-Step One: Your Junior must talk to other Juniors or Brownies about what they would like to do in their troop or as a Girl Scout. This can be future activity, badge, or anything they think of.

-Step Two: Your Junior must make a plan on how they think they can do the activity or badge from Step One. Their plan must include a few dates that this could happen, remind them about weather, holidays and other Girl Scout activities.

-Step Three: Your Junior must make a list of the supplies they may need for this activity. They should also include: who they need to contact, where the money will come from to complete this activity and where they can do this activity. This is theirs to keep, you do not need to turn it in.

-Step Four: Your Junior must share this plan with the rest of the troop.



Cadette, Senior and Ambassador Requirements:

-Step One: Your Girl Scout must talk to other Older Girls about what they would like to do in their troop or as a Girl Scout. This can be future activity, badge, or anything they think of.

-Step Two: Your Girl Scout must make a plan on how they think they can do the activity or badge from Step One. Their plan must include a few dates that this could happen, remind them about weather, holidays and other Girl Scout activities.

-Step Three: Your Girl Scout must make a list of the supplies they may need for this activity. They should also include: who they need to contact, where the money will come from to complete this activity and where they can do this activity. They should consult an adult on the list to confirm that it is complete. This is theirs to keep, you do not need to turn it in.

-Step Four: Your Girl Scout must include a basic budget for this activity. This is theirs to keep, you do not need to turn it in.

-Step Five: Your Girl Scout must share this plan with the rest of the troop.
